PALSave Textbook Creation Grants

Background

- Third publishing cohort for PALNI
- Part of the PALSave Affordable Learning Program
- Lilly Endowment Inc. funding
- Organized by OER Publishing Task Force starting late 2019
- Additional support by the Publishing Services Admin Team
- PALNI Publishing Projects Coordinator Heather Myers hired in 2022

Program Goals

- 1. Support the creation new open textbooks
- 2. Add to the options available in the Open Textbook Library
- 3. Enable OER adoption/course transformation
- 4. Save students money
- 5. Support student success and retention

Requirements

- 1. Faculty member at PALNI-supported institution (lead author)
- 2. Include only originally authored (at least 50% of the total work), Creative Commons licensed (derivatives authorized), and/or public domain works
- 3. Adopt the completed textbook
- 4. Share with a CC-BY license
- 5. Meets criteria for the Open Textbook Library

Open Textbook Library Criteria

Textbooks in the Open Textbook Library are considered open because they are free to use and distribute, and are licensed to be freely adapted or changed with proper attribution.


- 1. All content must be openly licensed.
- 2. Must be a complete textbook available as a complete portable file (e.g. PDF, EPUB).
- 3. Must be in use at multiple higher education institutions, or affiliated with a higher education institution, scholarly society, or professional organization.
- 4. Must be an original textbook (not a derivative of another textbook).

- Project manager to monitor progress
- Coordinate peer review and copyediting
- 3. Import and layout
- 4. Cover design
- 5. Print on demand option
- 6. Publish OER in online platform
- 7. Provide and maintain platform

Application Process

Send proposal requirements to palsave@palni.edu by January 15, 2023

- 1. CV or Resume of Lead Author
- 2. Completed PALSave Textbook Creation Grant Application

(Make a copy of the application document to complete the application. Completed applications should not exceed 10 pages.)

Application Sections

- Lead author information
- 2. Project information
 - a. Working title
 - b. brief description
 - c. need
 - d. audience
 - e. specifics
 - f. DEI
- 3. Budget: Single author (\$5000)/Multiple authors (\$6500)
- 4. Course information
- 5. Agree to <u>timeline</u> and <u>grant requirements</u>

Selection Process

Review and Selection

- Evaluation, selection, and awards will be determined by an internal review committee.
- Proposals will be evaluated on the quality of writing.
- Evaluated on how well proposal guidelines are met, using the <u>PALSave Textbook Creation Grants Rubric</u>.
- We would also like the texts to represent a wide range of participation across disciplines and institutions.

PALSave Textbook Creation Grants Rubric

Textbook description	Author provides a thorough and compelling description of the textbook	Author provides a description of the textbook, and provides good amount of detail	Author provides a description of the textbook, and provides some detail	Author's description is too brief to get a clear idea of the textbook

Reviewer has a good idea of the various elements the author plans to include	Author somewhat provides specific descriptions of textbook elements. Diversity, equity, and inclusion	Author provides a thorough description of how the proposed textbook addresses diversity, equity, and inclusion. Proposal clearly suggests how the text will reflect a diverse readership	Author provides a good description of how the proposed textbook addresses diversity, equity, and inclusion. Proposal suggests how the text will reflect a diverse readership	Author somewhat describes how the proposed textbook addresses diversity, equity, and inclusion. Reviewer has an idea how the text will reflect a diverse readership	Author does not describe how the proposed textbook addresses diversity, equity, and inclusion
